It's been both interesting and eventful year

Dear Friends,

Happy New Year! I hope the upcoming year brings you prosperity, success, and the pleasure of seeing your efforts rewarded.

2012 is coming to an end. It's been both interesting and eventful for us. This year, 18 students completed their three-year program and joined the ranks of EUSP graduates. We congratulate these young scholars, who helped us continue to improve and develop as an institution, and we wish them success on the path to further academic and career achievements in their chosen fields.

One of the most important results of our work this year has been launching a joint doctoral program with the European University Institute in Florence, one of Europe's best universities. Two of our students—Philipp Chapkovsky and Aleksandr Polyanichev—have successfully passed the entrance exams and begun their

studies in Florence, while their colleagues from the EUI are preparing to come to the EUSP. There were also positive changes in our international education programs: in September 2012, we launched our third international program, ENERPO (Energy Politics in Eurasia), which has admitted ten new students.

Thanks to the efforts of our glorious Educational office, the EUSP has completed the licensing procedures and has officially confirmed its status of an institute of higher education.

Our Board of Trustees has added two new members: Serge Schmemann, writer and editorial page editor of the International Herald Tribune, and Oleg Zherebtsov, founder of Lenta supermarket chain, who has done much for the development of the EUSP.

This fall, the university opened an office to work with students and alumni on employment and career opportunities. It will work closely with you, and will

rely on the achievements we are already proud of. Thus, thanks to your assistance the European Alumni Association has been supporting EUSP students with Travel Grants already for four years.

One of the things that we are launching now is a tradition to see and welcome you at our regular university events. Thus, we hope to see you at the Day of the EUSP in late March, when we will celebrate the fifth anniversary of the end of the "fire crisis," as well as at graduation in June.

Thank you for your support and your interest in EUSP life. I hope that together, we will make it even better in 2013.
